## **PRESS RELEASE - DR ALAN KERBEY**

Monkton Combe School's Director of Development has been awarded an OBE in the Queen's New Year's Honours List for services to medical research, education and young people.

Dr Alan Kerbey, who has worked at Monkton since 2002, began his career as a scientist. He studied at the universities of Bristol and Oxford and graduated with a PhD in Biochemistry in 1978. In 1985, he was appointed as a Senior Research Fellow at Oxford University and a Lecturer in Biochemistry at Trinity College, Oxford. He is the author of over 150 scientific papers, book chapters and commissioned articles on the molecular basis of insulin action in relation to the pathogenesis of diabetes and related disorders and has lectured extensively on his work to scientific audiences worldwide. Following the award of a Fellowship from the Royal Society, he established a programme of research with the Department of Medicine and Endocrinology at the University of Sydney, Australia and has collaborated with pharmaceutical companies on the development of anti-diabetic drugs. He was elected as a Fellow of Trinity Hall, University of Cambridge in 2000.

In 1992, Dr Kerbey left the world of academia to take up the post of Executive Director of Crusaders, an international Christian youth organisation. He was responsible for the development of new strategies which were aimed at engaging with an increasing number of young people, nationally and internationally, with a special emphasis on those who lived in deprived areas or who were marginalised, and this led to Crusaders enjoying its best ever rate of growth in the organisation's 90 year history. He was regularly invited by the national media to contribute on issues relating to young people and youth culture, he has edited a number of seminal books on youth work, and has been a member of Government working groups.

In 1998, he continued to combine his interests in research, education and young people when he was appointed as the Director of Development at Trinity Hall, University of Cambridge. During this time, he raised over £14m to support the college's development programme. He worked closely with Professor Stephen Hawking and the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Runcie, to establish Professorial Research Fellowships in the fields of Astrophysics and Theology respectively, and successfully campaigned - and secured - £2m of funding to enable these fellowships to be permanently endowed in their honour for the benefit of future generations of outstanding research workers.

Since 2002, Alan Kerbey's work at Monkton Combe School has involved the implementation of a range of highly successful programmes in the areas of marketing, public and external relations, and fundraising. Monkton is currently enjoying a period of transformational growth and development with record numbers of pupils joining the school and an investment of over £12m in new facilities.
